To His Excellency, A.B. Moore,
Governor of the State of Alabama.

The undersigned knows
who this the case of the State vs.
Julius Lowenthal, charged by
indictment in the City Court of
Mobile with Enticement at
the June Term 1858 of said Court.
We have to urge your Excellency
to extend clemency to him.

He was sentenced to the Penitentiary
for Four years. The undersigned in
consideration of the fact that he is a
foreigner (being a native of Germany and
necessarily ignorant in a great measure
of our laws & customs), his youth, the
great respectability & age of his parents,
& the singular devotion exhibited during
all his imprisonment & suffering on
the part of his wife, earnestly commends
the case to your favorable action.

If he is released he will
unorthodoxly return to Belgium,
and with that exception the undersigned
thinks that he should be pardoned.
And they are pleased to hear that
in this the Judge of the City Court
& the Solicitor concur with them.
