The State of Alabama Be fore me Joseph Currie  
Randolph County Judge of the Court of  
Probate in person came C. H. Smith who  
says on oath that he visited the jail with  
Mr Owens the jailer the morning after  
the escape of the prisoners Messrs Trent  
Weaver & Gregory and found that one  
of the cross bars had been sawed out  
of the window and used as a tool  
for breaking through the wooden door  
after sawing the bar into two which  
fastened the iron door. He further believes  
that Mr Owens has given a correct  
Statement of the ~~fact~~ situation and condition  
of the jail at and before the time of  
the escape of the prisoners Messrs Trent  
Weaver & Gregory. Sworn to and

The State of Alabama, Before me Joseph Leavie  
Randolph County, Judge of the Court of  
Probate in and for said County personally  
came before me this day Mr. James J. J. J.  
of said County who being duly sworn says  
that the jail of said County is situated on  
the outer edge of the town of Woodsee  
and that there is no enclosure around  
said jail, preventing the access of the public  
thereto, that the prisoners mentioned in the  
foregoing account, viz; S. C. Mearns, Cicero  
Gregory and R. B. Trent were confined in  
said jail in August 1858 and that they  
made their escape therefrom, by sawing a  
cross-bar out of the window so as to leave  
a sharp edge on one of the ends of the bar  
and also sawed into, the iron bar which  
fastened the iron door of the jail and  
then burst the lock off of the wooden and  
outer door of the jail, with the iron bar  
sawed out of the window and made  
their escape in the night and it is the  
belief of affiant, that the instrument  
by which the said bars were sawed into,  
was handed to the said prisoners, thro-  
ugh the iron grates of the window, by some  
one from without, and further that it has  
never been customary in this County, for  
the jailer or any one else to live in the  
jail. And the said jail was securely locked  
as usual on the night of the said escape  
and the said prisoners made their escape  
without the knowledge or <sup>or negligence</sup> connivance,  
of affiant and after said prisoners  
made their escape, affiant not being
