To His Excellency  
Gov A. M. Moore

Sir

The object of this is to solicit your executive interference for the pardon of Jacob Parmer who was convicted of Larceny from the person at the Spring Term 1858 of Barbour Circuit Court and is now in the penitentiary. I was employed to prosecute Parmer and therefore heard all the evidence in his case, and I take pleasure in stating there are good reasons for entertaining doubts as to his guilt. The only witness against him and upon whose testimony he was convicted was a man of known intemperate habits - was proven to have been drunk at the time of the

time of the alleged Larceny and  
to have made many and con-  
-tradictory statements to different  
persons in relation to the matter.

Previous to this unfortunate affair  
Mr Parmer was a man of  
unsullied private character and  
a useful citizen.

Upon the whole I think this  
is a case deserving the inter-  
-position of your Excellency and  
that such a course will be  
altogether consistent with the  
ends of justice.
